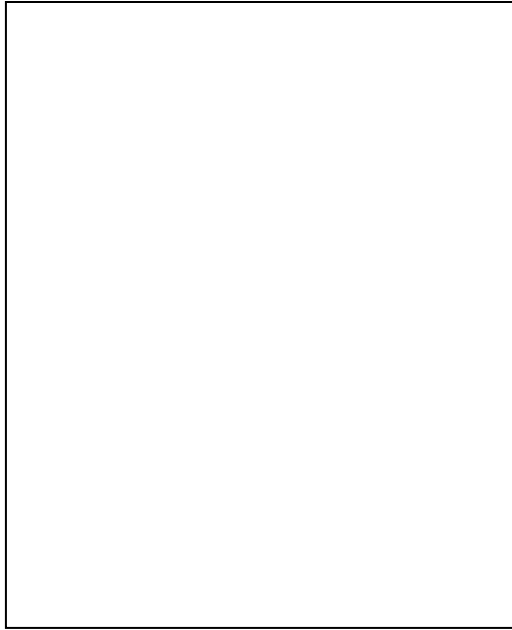

Follow up: After looking over newspaper ads, create an ad for your favorite food grown or raised in New York State.


