Different Points of View

The news stories in this newspaper provide you with current information about issues in your community, your state and the country. You know that the decisions made by local, state and national leaders will affect you and your family. What do others think about a current issue? This newspaper provides a forum for the exchange of ideas about important issues.

Look at the editorial and op-ed pages in this newspaper. You'll find editorials reflecting the official view of the newspaper and opinion columns in which political observers and participants offer their thoughts. There is another important part of the editorial page – letters to the editor. Concerned citizens, including you, can share ideas with the rest of the community. So if you want to see opposing points of view about an issue, go to the editorial page in this newspaper. Check it out!

TRY THIS: Read a news story about a current issue. Think about your position on the issue. Write a brief paragraph expressing your opinion. Now read the editorial page today, or over the next few days. Find columns or letters that agree with your opinion and columns or letters that disagree with your opinion. Write down three ideas that oppose yours. How has your thinking been changed by examining different points of view?

We can all improve our ability to communicate with others by increasing our vocabulary. This newspaper provides you with many opportunities to learn new words. Newspaper reporters are professional writers who select the language they use carefully and thoughtfully. They want to be accurate and engaging. Newspaper editors generally write the headlines for stories; they use language to get your attention and your interest. Sports reporters and editors are often considered the most colorful writers. Just look at the many different ways they can tell you that one team defeated another.

You'll find words related to the arts in the entertainment section, words about economics and careers in the business section, and words about building and renovating in how-to sections. As you read this newspaper to obtain information, take some time to enjoy the language as well. Check it out!

TRY THIS: Find new vocabulary words in this newspaper. Make a list of five words for each of these categories: government, arts/entertainment, sports teams, science and business. Now try to think of related words for each word on your list – for example, a word related to *governor* would be *government*.

Several times a week, your local merchants put information about sales and special offers in the advertising circulars that are inserted into this newspaper. On a daily basis, local merchants also place display ads throughout the newspaper, and some even advertise in the classified section. When you want to get the most for your money, look at the ads in this newspaper. Check it out!

TRY THIS: Make a list of five different products or services you might need in the next week, such as food, health/beauty products, office supplies or a haircut. Include places you would like to go, such as a movie, restaurant or live performance. Now see how many things on your list that you can locate in this newspaper. Put a check by each item you find.
